

Lesson Structure

During French lessons there are opportunities for children to engage in a number of activities.

The teaching of French involves the following:

Timetable

French is taught in KS2. French is timetabled for half an hour each week, every Friday. Throughout the week, class teachers will provide short recap sessions of the core knowledge from their year group French intent to consolidate learning.



French Beyond Lessons

Teachers find opportunities to use vocabulary and phrases taught in French in other parts of the school day. For example, answering the register in French; saying good morning in French etc. This allows children to practise key words and phrases to reinforce conversational language and vocabulary.



Specialist Teacher

At The Good Shepherd Academy, our French lessons are delivered by a specialist teacher, who speaks

fluent French. Class teachers are present in the lesson for their own CPD.



Cross-Curricular Links

Connections with French are made within our Geography curriculum. In Year 6 children will complete a com-

parison study on the UK, China and France where they will compare the human and physical geography of these countries. Throughout our English curriculum, links are made between the etymology of words and their French origins.



Interactive Lessons

All French lessons are interactive to allow for high engagement and participation. Children play games, sing songs, repeat words and phrases and engage in group and paired conversations. Children are active in their learning and enjoy the lessons.



School Values

Learning a language will support our children in developing respect towards others through intercultural awareness and through making links between British and French ways of life.



Vocabulary Development

Children learn a range of words in French and

how to pronounce these accurately. When learning new words, these are broken down into phonemes to support reading and pronunciation. Commonly used words and phrases are displayed in the classroom and referred to.



Reading in French

In French lessons there are opportunities to read short French texts and non-fiction books about France. Our library also contains books about France that children can access.



British Values Link

Language teaching promotes British Values as children gain an awareness of cultural difference and how we should respect these.



Pedagogical Principles

Languages teaching follows the school's approach to teaching and learning through pedagogical principles.

This ensures a consistent approach to teaching and learning across the school and ensures that children will acquire knowledge more successfully.
